<u>The Friars Primary School</u> <u>Road Safety Policy – September 2021</u>

RATIONALE

Road accidents are the greatest single threat of death or injury facing children. The Friars Primary School is concerned about all issues relating to road safety, both within the curriculum and day to day practices such as travel to the school site and organised school trips.

Supervising staff must take all due care when crossing roads with pupils. Indeed, their supervisory conduct must be exemplary.

Our most important priority is to minimise risk and to safeguard children at all times whilst in our care. There must be joint responsibility for children's safety with parents/carers and across the entire school community. It is with this in mind that the school therefore implements this Road Safety policy.

AIMS

To ensure that children, their parents and teachers are safe on the roads on, around and approaching the school To ensure a safe and efficient flow of traffic to, from and around the school at all times

To make pupils aware of the rules of the road and their responsibilities as road users

To teach children effective strategies for keeping safe on the roads as pedestrians, cyclists or passenger

To ensure that exemplary supervision is undertaken by supervisory staff when accompanying children on school trips whether such trips are local or further afield.

ROAD SAFETY PRACTICES

Walking to school

Where parents allow their children to walk to school, they should discuss with them an agreed safe route and how to stay safe on the road

Pupils who walk to school should be mindful of safe road use, refrain from unsafe practices that may compromise their own or others' personal safety and where there are no footpaths always walk on the right hand side of the road, facing and remaining alert for oncoming traffic.

Access to the school site

Pupils are not allowed to leave the school during school hours, unless they have written permission from their parents/carers and school has agreed – where they do so, they are expected to observe safe road use practices at all times.

Teachers will park in designated spaces on the school grounds, driving at all times with due care and giving priority to pedestrians.

Parents should park safely and appropriately, with due regard to pedestrians and other road users.

Parents are not permitted to park on the school grounds for collection and drop-off at Breakfast or After School Club.

Goods delivery traffic will not be allowed access to pupil areas of the school grounds during school hours except where absolutely necessary and will then be carefully directed to designated loading/set-down points.

School Trips

Parents will be notified before any school trip and must give written consent for their child's attendance.

Coaches with seat belts will be hired and safety belts worn at all times by adults and children.

The school will ensure that adequate adult supervision is provided on trips and that adults are fully briefed on their responsibilities and duties.

When crossing a road, safe crossing places will be used wherever possible; supervising staff should always seek to find a safe crossing place (with traffic and pedestrian crossing lights) in the first instance, particularly in urban areas where such facilities are common. In the Salford and Manchester areas such facilities are plentiful. Any accompanying adults should follow the directions of the teacher-in-charge and use the appropriate safety rules for crossing. Because pedestrian crossing lights change fairly rapidly, supervising staff should 'chunk' groups into smaller units, each one crossing at intervals when the lights indicate it is suitable to do so.

If an accident occurs, the designated adult will take responsibility for the group whilst the incident is dealt with. Wherever possible, a qualified "First Aider" will accompany the trip.

THE ROLE OF PARENTS

In addition to procedures outlined above, parents have a pivotal role to play in helping to promote Road Safety with their children. They should help their children develop road safety skills and encourage them to become independent and responsible road users.

THE ROLE OF THE SCHOOL

The Head Teacher and staff will:

Ensure appropriate adult supervision of pupils boarding and disembarking of school buses and on school trips. Work in partnership with pupils, parents and wider community, including the Council and DOE, on local Road Safety issues.

LEARNING AND TEACHING

The school will provide opportunities for pupils to examine risk and dangers on the roads, develop knowledge and skills to maintain personal safety, and encourage children to make safe and healthy choices. Information will be given to pupils, staff and parents in line with the most up-to-date, best practice advice:

The school will, where appropriate, work in partnership with local and regional support agencies and the police agencies in the planning, delivery and review of Road Safety education.

The school will where appropriate participate in useful awareness-raising initiatives and strategies that promote Road Safety within our wider community e.g. Road Safety Week, Safe Routes to School.

Transport after school hours

Children participating in after schools clubs or sports fixtures will be safely driven to their destination, if off site, by a driver with suitable driving/minibus license. They will wear seatbelts in vehicle; they will embark and disembark the vehicle safely.

For after school clubs on site (and return to school from trips or offsite activities), children will make their own way home (if permission has been granted) or be collected at the end of the club.
